# Fellowship by the numbers





# Awards & Recognition



In April, the founder of Seres was awarded a Global Inclusive Growth Spark Grant. The grant provides seed, catalytic funding to spark further development and impact. Seres is committed to promoting environmentally sustainable tourism while empowering local communities, particularly women.



On July 13, Mirei was named one of three recipients of the McNulty Award for Marea Verde's work on promoting a sustainable future as well as its track record in advocating for environmental policies.




In September, Rodrigo received the Alumni Engagement Innovation Fund from the U.S. Department of State to implement a project called "Tech Future is Female". He is the first Salvadoran to receive this award on 3 occasions (2013, 2019 and 2023) totaling USD 75,000 in funding.



In June, Aline entered the Global Business Hall of Fame as one of the most outstanding women leaders in Honduras and Central America.



On September 19, her Green Health initiative won the Forest and Health Challenge promoted by the World Economic Forum's UpLink Innovation Network. Salud Verde works in partnership with Mayan communities to preserve the knowledge of this indigenous culture as an alternative to current health treatments. The Forest Challenge recognizes innovative solutions that emphasize the interdependence between forests and human health and well-being.



In October, The Chou Ta Kuan Foundation in Taiwan awarded David for his efforts in promoting the inclusion of people with disabilities in the productive life of Salvadoran society.




**María Pacheco**CALI 1 | Guatemala

On December 4, Wakami received a special mention at the Trust for the Americas Awards, a non-profit organization affiliated to the Organization of American States, for creating value chains that connect rural communities, especially women, with national and international markets.



She was acknowledged on May 31 for her excellent performance and invaluable work at the head of the Institutional Operations Unit of the Teaching Hospital of Honduras, especially during the most critical moments of the COVID-19 pandemic.



CALI 15 | El Salvador

Won first place in the Intellectual Property Award presented by the law firm Romero Pineda & Asociados. The award recognizes the creative contribution of Salvadorans whose manifestations strengthen the work of protection, defense and monetization of Intellectual Property.



On January 13, she was recognized as a Notable Citizen 2022 by the National Commission for Civic and Moral Values in Panama for having created the organization Voluntarios de Panamá and the Ponte-en-Algo platform, which mobilizes volunteers from 230 NGOs.



In June, the World Economic Forum included Juan Pablo as one of the Young Global Leaders under the age of 40 recognizing him as a leader with extensive experience in the food & beverages industry. In 2020 he was appointed CEO of Apex Global Mobility where he leads the corporate units.



On May 26, the 82-minute documentary "Patrol" premiered at the Mountainfilm festival in Colorado, USA. The film shows the struggle of indigenous and afro descendent communities to preserve The Indio Maíz Biosphere Reserve's natural resources in the face of the advance of illegal cattle ranching in protected areas with the complicity and corruption of the State. 




# New Appointments



Took office in January as president of the Association of Journalists and Professionals in Communication Sciences, after an election that the organization's internal Elections Tribunal described as "historic". She will hold the position for two years. Her election comes at a time of tension between the Executive Power and the press in Costa Rica.



On August 2, he received his congressman credentials for the term 2024-2028.



On November 17, the Central American Bank for Economic Integration (BCIE) elected Gisela as its new Chief Executive Officer for the next five years, with her term commencing on December 1. Gisela is the first woman to hold this position.



On March 24, Father Marco was elected as a new member of the board of directors for the International Federation of Fe y Alegría. This election took place during the XXXVIII General Assembly of the International Federation of Fe y Alegría, which was held in Honduras.



First non-Colombian-national to be appointed as a member of the Superior Council of the Universidad de Los Andes, on June 14, 2023 and for a period of 6 years. In addition, the YPO Latin America Region introduced Luis Javier as its Regional Impact Award Winner.

# AnGo

AnGO is a free educational app to improve literacy in rural Central America. The app was developed under the umbrella of Project Alianza, founded by Kristin Van Busum, CALI Fellow Class 15. Brooktrout Partners, a Maryland-based technology consulting firm, and Boston consulting firm Bain & Company collaborated with the app's development.

The app has been available since October 2023 in the Apple and Android app stores. It offers interactive video games and progress tracking for its users as young as 4 years old.

Project Alianza built 16 schools in Nicaragua, trained 200 educators and in the last five years has taught more than 160,000 children to read and write.

# **INnovaLab**

INnovaLab, an innovation lab in El Salvador, facilitates relationships between academia, government and investment capital to transfer specialized knowledge of innovation and continuous improvement through agile methodologies, develop business models of the future and provide the positioning of an innovative company.

Rodrigo Tona, CALI Fellow Class 14, serves as CEO of INnovaLab and Ternova Group. The initiative was born out of Ternova's alliance with the Salvadoran Association of Industrialists (ASI) and the United States Agency for International Development (USAID).

In just 18 months, INnovaLab successfully boosted the sales of small and medium-sized enterprises and startups in El Salvador by more than \$3 million.

# **Punto y Aparte**

Punto y Aparte is directed by Yanancy Noguera, a CALI Fellow Class 4 from Costa Rica. The project's purpose is to promote a well-informed society through responsible media and professional communicators committed to quality journalism. Each training cycle for new journalists lasts five months. Each student has a mentor to guide and inspire them. Between 2016 and 2023, Punto y Aparte has graduated 15 Classes totaling 120 students from four different universities in the country, and has formed a pool of 70 mentors.



# **Urbana Housing Fund**

Urbana Housing Fund has the mission to generate a rich supply of Sustainable and Affordable Housing in cities in Guatemala, El Salvador and Honduras. Eduardo Tabush, a CALI Fellow Class 5 of Guatemala is the founder and CEO.

The first 8 projects in the 4 largest cities in the region are already underway. In 2023, Urbana was one of the three winners in the "Social and Community Initiatives" category of the Urban Housing Practitioners Hub (UHPH) competition for inspiring housing and habitat practices in the face of climate change.



# Mosaico

MOSAICO PANAMA: COUNTRY OF OPPORTUNITIES was born as part of the celebrations of the 140th anniversary of Congregation Kol Shearith Israel in May 2016. In 2023, the initiative celebrated its fifth edition. This is a space in which outstanding voices from Panama share through lectures their personal and professional reflections on how diversity, multiculturalism, respect and freedom have made Panama a great country, to which through the centuries people from all over the world, of different ethnicities, cultures and religions have migrated to make it their home. The project is led by Rabbi Gustavo Kraselnik, CALI 6 of Panama.



# MOMENTUM: Connecting reflection to action

The event highlighted the importance of transforming reflections into proactive actions to more effectively drive progress towards a more prosperous Central America.

The Regional took place at Casa Museo Santo Domingo hotel in Antigua, Guatemala, on March 8-11, 2023, and emphasized on bonding - bridging - building, aiming to encourage commitment both at the individual level through each participant's spheres of influence and collectively through the power of the network.

We gathered 162 Fellows from the 6 countries that make up the network, as well as 82 special guests and sponsors from around the world, for a total of 244 participants.

It was a gathering opportunity to connect, share experiences and reflect on how, from the participants' leadership perspective, can they collaborate and contribute to the construction of a more prosperous and inclusive Central America.

Although the event is held every 2 years, the pandemic interrupted this regularity and Fellows, funders, sponsors and other leaders in the region had to wait five years since the last meeting in 2018 for this regional gathering.

The CALI Regional event is intended to understand the region's current challenges, inspire its leaders to improve and deepen their leadership skills, build relationships among the different classes and develop capacities to address the main social challenges in their countries.


# The Next Generation of CALI Leaders



We extend our heartfelt gratitude to all who actively participated, contributing to the formation of an exceptional pool of nominees.






# Glasswing International: Mentoring Program

In partnership with Glasswing International, CALI convened 17 Fellows to participate in the Central American Service Corps pilot mentoring program.

The Central American Service Corps harnesses the power of young people ages 14-22 to drive change and thrive in their own communities by implementing projects that provide them with job skills, leadership training and community investment.

Seventeen CALI Fellows participated in two distinct phases; each had the opportunity to lead 10 interactive 90-minute sessions with groups of up to 12 youth, for a total of 15 hours over five months.



# **CALI-H Foundation:** Emerging Leaders in Spanish Program

The Honduran Leadership Alliance Program (HOLA) was successfully inaugurated from November 30 to December 3, 2023. This seminar marked a special milestone as the first Aspen-style program in Spanish in Central America.

Guiding us throughout the event were two of our skilled moderators: Hildegard Vásquez, at the forefront, and Denise Vargas as the second moderator. Seventeen participants immersed themselves in discussions and activities.

# **McNulty Moderators:** Training in Spanish

As part of the collaboration between CALI and Aspen Colombia, we conducted the first training of moderators in Spanish in Colombia from Sunday 22nd to Friday 27th October 2023.

The main objective of this training was to consolidate the team of moderators in Spanish language under the Socratic method, and thus contribute to the development of a culture of dialogue and the creation of a community of people willing to promote debate and reflection as the backbone of our society. The training was led by Hildegard Vásquez and Stace Lindsay.

In a generous gesture, the McNulty Foundation covered 70% of the costs for each participant, a contribution that we are grateful for as it was crucial to carry out the workshop. Thanks also to Aspen Colombia for inviting CALI to be part of this opportunity.







# Origin and Mission

The Central America Leadership Initiative (CALI) was founded in 2004 by the Aspen Institute, INCAE, Fundemas, Technoserve and leading figures from the business and academic worlds. We are a non-profit, non-partisan and non-sectarian organization.

CALI shapes cross-sectoral leadership groups in Central America with the goal of fostering their collective contribution to driving positive and transformative change in the region.

# Vision

To create a vibrant and globally connected community of Central American leaders willing to address the region's greatest challenges through dialogue, leadership and action.

# Our Approach

We identify entrepreneurial and successful leaders who have the will to generate social impact and expand their influence. Through scholarships granted by the CALI Foundation, they participate in a two-year program with four seminars based on the Socratic model of the Aspen Institute. These seminars promote introspection and redefinition of their role as agents of change. The seminars are moderated by experts, and encourage dialogue based on readings that are discussed in small groups. This methodology allows for interaction among diverse leaders and the discovery of new ideas to broaden their impact in their spheres of influence.

# The transformative Fellowship experience

Unites a diverse group of people who challenge and support each other during the program and throughout their lives.

Cultivates and refines values through four transformative seminars, based on the Aspen Method used for over 70 years: which, through carefully selected and curated readings, generates a moderated dialogue among Fellows.

Creates opportunities for discussion, reflection and shared reading among Fellows.

Turns ideas into actions that impact society as members practice values-based leadership with integrity in their daily lives.

Provides tools that promote a critical and stimulating exchange of ideas and contributions to action.

Empowers leaders committed to inclusive, sustainable development and the well-being of their countries and the region in their various fields.

Develops efforts focused on social action and fundraising, encouraging collaboration to achieve the self-sustainability of our program.







# **About the Leadership Program Seminars**

Over the course of two years, Fellows participate in four seminars that provide values-based leader-ship training. These seminars focus on discussion and reflection on readings, stimulating critical thinking and the search for solutions to social problems. As a result, Fellows design a personal project. The seminars promote dialogue and creativity in a collaborative environment.

#### **Seminar I:**

The Challenge of Leadership.
During 5 days we work on the leadership qualities needed to master the forces of change. Fellows discuss their own challenges and develop criteria for effective and enlightened leadership.

#### **Seminar II:**

The Aspen Seminar. Over the course of 7 days Fellows explore the concept of "the good society" and their role in making it a reality. Fellows present and discuss their leadership projects.

#### **Seminar III:**

Leading in an Era of Globalization. Six days to explore the challenges of leading in an increasingly complex and interconnected world. This seminar is offered in conjunction with Fellows of the Aspen Global Leadership Network (AGLN).

#### **Seminar IV:**

The Promise of Leadership. In four days Fellows explore the concepts of legacy and life balance, and share progress made, challenges encountered, and lessons learned in the project they are developing to graduate.

# How is impact generated?

Leaving a mark through leadership is at the heart of CALI. We inspire social change from the root of personal transformation, professional purpose and collective need. Through a commitment to a life of impact, Fellows contribute to their areas of influence through their

- 1. Projects or ventures: initiatives conceived or led by a Fellow, incubated during the two years of attending seminars. The initiative must address a pressing social need or issue that the Fellow identifies in his or her community, country or the world. These initiatives mark the beginning of each Fellow's lifelong commitment to action and impact.
- 1. Impact Journey: the Impact Journey refers to the impact of the Fellows after their experience in CALI seminars, considering that some have created ventures, others have reoriented their professional lives and others have redoubled their efforts in the areas of impact in which they work. Everyone has their own path to create impact and for many, the CALI experience fuels that inner flame.

# Organizational structure of the **CALI** Foundation

# In 2023, the Central America Leadership Initiative (CALI) updated its governance structure at the regional and country levels.

At the regional level, CALI's governance structure includes a Board of Directors, an Advisory Council, the CALI Management Team and an Executive Committee of Fellows composed of leaders from each country.

At the country level, CALI is organized through Country Leadership Committees, each composed of three members: the Transition Mentor, the Country Leader and the Successor Leader, positions responsible for overseeing the evolution of the Fellowship in the country and fostering a sense of ownership and commitment among the Fellows.


